In May, the board develops a budget for the next fiscal year based on pledges received. Then, at the Pilgrim House Annual Meeting June 3, the membership elects a new board of directors and approves a new budget. The new board uses the approved budget to guide expenditures throughout the year.

What does it cost to keep Pilgrim House running?

• Our 2017-2018 budget was approximately \$42,210 of which we planned \$23,600 for building and grounds, including repairs, utilities, plowing/mowing, cleaning, etc. The remainder is divided among adult programs, children's programs, UUA dues, conferences, and publicity.

• A major expenditure for 2018 will be replacement of the parking lot steps.

Additionally, we are funding a savings account for future replacements of furnaces, kitchen appliances, siding & roofing, parking lot maintenance, etc.

GREAT DECISIONS AT PILGRIM HOUSE

April 5: Turkey: a Partner in Crisis

Of all NATO allies, Turkey represents the most daunting challenge for the Trump administration. In the wake of a failed military coup in July 2016, the autocratic trend in Ankara took a turn for the worse. One year on, an overwhelming majority of the population considers the United States to be their country's greatest security threat. In this age of a worsening "clash of civilizations" between Islam and the West, even more important than its place on the map is what Turkey symbolically represents as the most institutionally Westernized Muslim country in the world.

Our speaker will be Ambassador Ross Wilson, who has talked with us previously on Foreign Trade and the history of the Kurds. Over the course of a thirty year career in the US Foreign Service, he served as American ambassador to Turkey in 2005-08 and to Azerbaijan in 2000-03. Elsewhere overseas, he held assignments at the US embassies in Moscow and Prague and at the US consulate general in Melbourne, Australia. In Washington, Ambassador Wilson was principal deputy to the ambassador-at-large and special advisor to the Secretary of State for the new independent states of the former Soviet Union in 1997-2000. He presently serves as chairman of the board of the Institute of Turkish Studies and is a member of the Eurasia Foundation Advisory Council and of the boards of directors of Global Minnesota and the American Friends of Turkey.
