VOLUNTEER FOR SAFETY!

In order to help reduce our risks and increase our level of preparedness for most any emergency, at the February meeting the Pilgrim House Board passed a resolution to establish and maintain a Safety Committee. This is recommended as a "best practice" by the Ramsey County Sheriff's Office and is in line with other area churches.

The committee will be responsible for evaluating and documenting safety at PH with regards to weather, health, or other emergencies. GREAT DECISIONS

March 7 – The Rise of Populism in Europe

This is the program that was canceled due to weather on February 7.

Mass migration, and the problems associated with it, have directly abetted the rise of populist parties in Europe. Opposition to immigration was the prime driver of support for Brexit, it brought a far-right party to the German Bundestag for the first time since the 1950s, and propelled Marine Le Pen to win a third of the vote in the French presidential election. In addition to calling for stronger borders, however, these parties are invariably illiberal, anti-American, anti-NATO and pro-Kremlin, making their rise a matter of serious concern for the national security interests of the United States.

Our speaker is Christa Tiefenbacher-Hudson A native of Germany, Christa is a founding member of the German American Chamber of Commerce Midwest, Minnesota Chapter, and served as the Chamber's president from 2000 to 2004, as vice president from 2010 to 2016, and is now an honorary director. From March 2010 until May 2016, Christa held the post of honorary consul of the Federal Republic of Germany in Minneapolis, with a consular district that encompassed Minnesota, North and South Dakota and Western Wisconsin. In September 2018, Christa was awarded the Order of Merit of the Federal Republic of Germany for her contributions to enhancing Germany's standing abroad and its relations with the United States in economic, cultural, political and social matters.

RAIN GARDEN AT PILGRIM HOUSE

The Pilgrim House (PH) Board has approved moving forward with the installation of a rain garden. The rain garden will be located in the depressed area just west of the driveway as you turn off Highway 96 to enter the PH parking lot. Currently the area is filled with chunks of concrete and invasive and non-attractive plants. Rain water, with pollutants from the parking lot, washes into the depression and overflows to the trail and into the storm sewers of Highway 96.

A properly constructed rain garden prevents water from rushing through by using an elevated berm and a re-

constructed basin using amended soils. Water then infiltrates into the soil and is sucked up by the plants within 24 hours. A rain garden is not a pond with standing water.

PH qualifies for a grant up to \$7,500 from the Rice Creek Watershed District toward the installation of a rain garden. We worked with Brian Olsen from Ramsey County Soil and Water Conservation District to get detailed plans for the rain garden. Brian determined that the total catchment area treated by the proposed project is 23,912 square feet, and is mostly impervious surfaces. Once established, this rain garden will greatly increase the runoff captured from the church's impervious surfaces and be an effective measure to filter runoff, reduce sediment movement, and reduce the rate and volume of stormwater that would otherwise run off into the storm sewers, ultimately ending up in Karth Lake.

The rain garden design was submitted to approved vendors and the best bid was from Outdoor Lab Landscape Design, St. Paul for a total cost of \$12,128. Pilgrim House is responsible for \$4,628, the amount that the project will cost beyond the \$7,500 grant. The PH board approved spending that amount. The grant application has been submitted to the Rice Creek Watershed District for their approval. We expect approval at their March meeting.

The installation date is tentatively set for mid-June. Actual timing will depend on weather and previously scheduled project completion. The plan includes 166 native plants which will be a beautiful addition to other work that has been done at PH to remove invasive species. The project will have a great educational benefit with high visibility, both to members attending PH, and to the public who are using the trail or driving by on Highway 96

Once the rain garden is installed, volunteers to maintain the area will be needed. If this is something you are interested in, let us know.
