MULTICULTURAL COMMUNITY WORKSHOP (ANNETTE MARQUIS)

- Multiculturalism defined: All people are welcome as blessings and the human family lives whole and reconciled. Includes people with different beliefs/culture
- Challenge to us: How do we welcome others? How do we include others? Particularly those with different beliefs/culture
- Questions: Why is this topic important/scary/exciting/challenging?
- Do technical work: changes in our services/activities; heart work of living our principles
- Better understand white privilege.

MY-HAT: MY MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS TEAM

Support group for people dealing with mental health issues.

Three women told about mental health issues in their lives.

They wear hats and also a button that says ,'ask me about MyHat' as a way to open the discussion about mental illness.

Everyone knows somebody who is dealing with a mental health issue Make congregations aware of the issues and how to be supportive.

Suggestions

- Present programs on the issues relating to mental illness,
- Form a support group ,
- List resources on the church website ,
- Have designated members of the congregation to go to for info/help.

Overall the workshop was presented in a very fun and upbeat way . It reduced the stigma of mental illness.

SOCIAL JUSTICE WORKSHOP (REPRESENTATIVES FROM MI, IL, MN)

Minnesota Unitarian Universalist Social Justice Alliance (MUUSJA) - Rev. Ashley Horan

State networks link UU congregations, thus strengthening the voice heard for social justice, particularly valuable for small groups.

- MUUSJA partners with other faith-based and secular movements for justice.
- MUUSJA funding comes mostly from donations. Some congregations have a budget line item

The role of MUUSJA:

- 1) Serving as a hub of rapid response via Facebook, email, etc. to announce opportunities to join others for action
- 2) building capacity in congregations for social justice work

INCOME INEQUALITY WORKSHOP

Congregational Study Action Issue (CSAI) for UUA: study and act upon the problem

- Rich people do not create jobs, consumers do by creating demand for products.
- Put money in the hands of those who buy products.
