



## Upcoming Sunday Programs (10:15 to 11:30 am)

### April 7 – Speaking Out: Why I Stand

Join Rachel Carter, intern minister at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation in Eau Claire and U.S. Army veteran, as she talks about her journey and advocacy work with military sexual trauma and Post-Traumatic Stress.

Rachel Carter is the intern minister at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation in Eau Claire, Wisconsin and a second year seminary student at Iliff School of Theology. She has been an active advocate regarding Post-Traumatic Stress, Military Sexual Trauma and invisible disabilities. She served as a broadcast journalist assigned to Armed Forces Network-Korea as well as the Wisconsin National Guard. Rachel identifies as a person with multiple disabilities, including Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome, Postural Orthostatic Tachycardia Syndrome, Dysautonomia, and Fibromyalgia. She will be presenting at this year's General Assembly in Spokane, WA on Dis-Abilities: A Discussion on Inclusion, Accessibility, and Identity.




### April 14 – Children's Defense Fund-Minnesota – Bharti Wahi, Executive Director

## **2019 FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTION PLEDGE DRIVE**

It's that time again for our annual pledge drive! The requests will be mailed out the first week of April, with a requested return date of April 21st. The process is explained below.

The board of directors thank you for your continued support of Pilgrim House.

As a lay-led, all volunteer fellowship, we rely on member support in the form of time, talent, and financial contributions.

### **What is the Process?**

- Each year we ask members and supporters to make a contribution pledge for the coming fiscal year (begins June 1, 2019). The board treats these pledges as advisory statements.

- In May, the board develops a budget for the next fiscal year based on pledges received.

- At the annual meeting (May/June), the membership elects a new board of directors and adopts a budget. The approved budget is used to guide expenditures throughout the year.

### **What does it cost to keep Pilgrim House running?**

- Our 2018-2019 budget was \$43,020. We planned \$16,800 for building and grounds, including repairs, utilities, plowing/mowing, cleaning, etc., and \$8,100 for the capital improvement savings account. The remainder was divided among adult programs, children's programs, UUA dues, conferences, and publicity.

- A major expenditure for 2018 was the replacement of the parking lot steps. A major expense for 2019 will be the rain garden installation.

As noted above, we are funding a savings account for future replacements of furnaces, kitchen appliances, siding & roofing, parking lot maintenance, etc.

## **RAIN GARDEN STATUS UPDATE**

Pilgrim House is eligible for a grant up to \$7,500 from the Rice Creek Watershed District (RCWD) toward the installation of a rain garden. We worked with Brian Olsen from Ramsey County Soil and Water Conservation District to get detailed plans for the rain garden.

- The grant application has been submitted to the Rice Creek Watershed District.

- Brian presents the project to the RCWD Citizen Advisory Committee on April 3.

- We expect approval at the RCWD Board of Managers meeting on April 10.

The installation date is tentatively set for mid-June. Actual timing will depend on weather and previously scheduled project completion. The plan includes 166 native plants which will be a beautiful addition to other work that has been done at PH to remove invasive

species. The project will have a great educational benefit with high visibility, both to members attending PH, and to the public who are using the trail or driving by on Highway 96

Once the rain garden is installed, volunteers to maintain the area will be needed. If this is something you are interested in, let us know.

## GREAT DECISIONS

### April 4 – Middle East in Turmoil

As the presidency of Donald J. Trump passes the halfway point, the Middle East remains a region in turmoil. The Trump administration has aligned itself with strongmen in Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates and Egypt, which along with Israel have a common goal of frustrating Iranian expansion. What will be the fallout from policy reversals such as withdrawing from the Iranian nuclear accord and moving the U. S. embassy in Israel to Jerusalem? Does the United States see a path forward in troubled states such as Syria, Yemen, Libya and Iraq?

Our speaker is Nicholas Hayden.

Nicholas is a graduate of the University of Utah with a Master of Arts degree in History. His specializations include the contemporary Middle East, International Relations, Security Studies, and American Foreign Policy. He has worked with nonprofit think tanks such as the National Council on U.S.-Arab Relations and the Middle East Policy Council. His blog and podcast series, The Orientalist Express <http://orientalistexpress.com/>, simplifies current events in international relations to make foreign affairs easier to understand for the everyday person. Other prominent publications include his Master's Thesis "Brothers in Arms: American and Saudi-Arabian Relations during the Soviet-Afghan War," and "Combating Insurgency in British Palestine." He lives in St. Paul with his wife Hannah and newborn daughter Mira.
