


Upcoming Sunday Programs (10:15 to 11:30 am)

September 13 – Water Communion – Water is used to purify and sanctify, to nurture, refresh, and restore. Water flows through us; it circulates in our blood, and exits via perspiration from hard work and through tears of joy or despair. Come join in acknowledging the qualities of water that are essential to our lives, both physically and metaphorically. How would you bless our world? What would you wash away? What needs to be revitalized?



Likewise, where do you go to seek rejuvenation for yourself? Is there a body of water that is special to you? Bring your memories of a favorite body of water: a lake, river or ocean, perhaps somewhere you have recently visited. What makes this body of water special to you? We will invite our youth and their families to be the first to share, and then we will cycle through the rest of the participants.



September 20 – Eight Years to the Moon – Nancy Atkinson

The speaker, Nancy Atkinson, is author of *Eight Years to the Moon*. Space journalist and insider Nancy Atkinson weaves together the riveting story of NASA's mission to complete "the greatest adventure on which humankind ever embarked." This incredible account is a keepsake celebrating some of the most important and dramatic events in modern history. Told through over 60 personal interviews and oral histories, as well as personal photographs, this tribute to the men and women who made the Apollo 11 mission a reality chronicles the highs and lows that accompanied the race to the Moon: the devastating flash fire that killed the crew of Apollo 1; the awe of those who saw their years-in-the-making contributions to space exploration blast off from Cape Canaveral; the knuckle-biting descent of Apollo 11 to the lunar surface; a near-catastrophic event on the crew's flight home; the infectious excitement and jubilation across the world after the astronauts returned safely to Earth. These little-known stories of the dedicated engineers, mathematicians and scientists in the 1960s reveal the "hows" of the Apollo missions and bring to life the wonder and excitement of humanity's first steps on the Moon.

September 27 – Black Lives UU

Black Lives of UU, or BLUU, is an independent organization, fiscally sponsored by the UUA, which provides ministry for, and by, Black Unitarian Universalists, while also working to expand the role and visibility of Black UUs within our faith. In the fall they held a national symposium, in St. Paul, to explore what a Black UU theology could look like; it was the first of their convenings to invite white participation. Ellen Shelton attended and found it very moving and very informative. She will give us a briefing on what she observed and learned and what it could mean for PH.

Pandemic Fund Distributions

The final Pandemic Fund contribution total was \$11,634, comprising member contributions of \$6,819 and a match of \$4,815 from Paul and Suzanne Hanifl. The board agreed to add \$8,365 from this year's budget surplus for a total of \$20,000. This fund total was distributed evenly to the following organizations: Ralph Reeder Food Shelf, Alexandra House, and the Community Support Center.

Following the death of George Floyd and subsequent events, it was suggested to the board that some money set aside for the PH Community Pandemic Fund might be spent on causes related to recent events.

A SUCCESSFUL GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) holds an annual meeting with its congregations, known as General Assembly, at various locations around the United States in June. This year's event, originally scheduled for Providence Rhode Island, successfully went virtual via Zoom.

Participating from Pilgrim House were our voting delegates Mary Ryan and Nancy Olson and attendees Mel Aanerud and Kathy Aanerud. Total attendance was 4,925, with 2,359 voting delegates from 635 congregations in 49 states.

At the Bridging program that honors high school graduates, Dianna Jones participated with a video. Other Pilgrim House members attended the virtual Sunday morning program made available to all and enjoyed the 140-member virtual choir.

The main theme of General Assembly was the impact of 400 years of colonialism on indigenous people -- highlighted by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz's presentation, author of *An Indigenous People's History of the United States*. (She has accepted an invitation to speak to Pilgrim House via Zoom on November 8!!)

A multitude of workshops were available on topics that included Having Anti-Racist Conversations; Gratitude as a Spiritual Practice; Why Diversity, Equity, Inclusion Matter to Your Congregations; and topics relating to congregational organization and leadership. Additional Pilgrim House invitations for Sunday program speakers have been extended to some favorite workshop presenters.)

Business items included adopting two Actions of Immediate Witness: (1) 400 Years of White Supremacist Colonialism, calling on congregations to be in solidarity with indigenous people, and (2) Amen to Uprising: A Commitment and Call to Action, responding to police violence. Also presented was the report, Widening the Circle of Concern, to support long term cultural and

institutional changes to redeem ideals and promises within Unitarian Universalism. Future Pilgrim House programs and/or actions could be arranged to support these issues.

PILGRIM HOUSE COVID PREPAREDNESS PLAN – 19 AUG 2020

In compliance with State and Federal Guidelines, the Pilgrim House Board has adopted the following COVID Preparedness Plan, effective immediately.

Access to the building

In light of the virus's persistence in our communities, and since the PH membership includes a large number of people at high-risk for the pandemic, we are suspending all meetings in the PH building, including Sunday services and small group meetings. Access to the building is restricted to necessary maintenance functions: cleaning, servicing equipment, repairs as needed, planned physical plant upgrades, access to documents. The number entering should be limited to 2 or 3 at a time. We ask all people to refrain from entering the building for other purposes, including use of the kitchen or the restrooms. Use of the library is suspended for the time being.

The Safety Committee will monitor the progress of the pandemic on a monthly basis for the Board to review whether conditions warrant relaxing these guidelines. Criteria suggested by UUA include:

- Reduction of infections over several weeks
- Availability of adequate testing
- Availability of vaccinations

We will maintain a sign on the south door outlining these restrictions, and will supply disinfectant supplies, masks, and gloves near the entrance for use by those who need to enter the building. A sign-in sheet (name, date, and amount of time spent inside) will be maintained near the entrance to facilitate contact tracing if someone becomes infected. We ask people who enter the building to use masks, and to disinfect hands and frequently touched surfaces (especially light switches and door handles).

Small group gatherings

Currently small groups are meeting outdoors in parks and in our parking lot with social distancing and/or masks. We suggest the following guidelines for safe meetings:

- People should bring their own chairs and drinks.
- Six feet or more social distancing should be maintained at all times.



Rooted, Inspired, & Ready!

- We strongly recommend that people wear masks, even with social distancing, as recent evidence suggests the virus readily travels more than the recommended 6-ft distance.
- We discourage bringing food, as people have to remove masks to eat. We recommend food not be shared unless it is commercially prepackaged in individual portions.
- Communal singing or chanting should be avoided, as these are high-dispersion activities.
